EUDORA WELTY

Can a Mississippi woman who wrote fiction in the shadow of William Faulkner survive into the 21st Century? Eudora Welty won every possible literary prize (the Pulitzer Prize, the National Book Award, eight O'Henry Awards, etc.) except the Nobel Prize in Literature, which Faulkner won. Widely traveled, she was also a "shrewd observer" of her times. Here is a first class writer who infuses her stories with both humor and life enriching themes. Anyone who writes or aspires to write fiction can profit from her masterful techniques, and anyone can relate to and learn from the universal life dramas she presents growing out of southern soil.



This class will also reflect on the relationships Welty had with other writers, notably and perhaps surprisingly the author of detective novels Ross Macdonald.

Janice Moore enjoyed a long teaching career in the English Department at Young Harris College, serving as Chair of the Humanities Division for eight years and teaching a variety of literature classes as well as creative writing. For a dozen years she served as poetry editor for Georgia Journal. Her own poetry has been published in many journals, anthologies, and in her chapbook Teaching the Robins. In 2010 she published an article in The Flannery O'Connor Review about O'Connor's correspondence with Betty Hester, a former Young Harris College student.

HARRY S. TRUMAN

The death of Franklin Roosevelt as World War II entered its final stages thrust a little known vice president onto the world stage. It was up to Harry Truman to fill the gigantic shoes of a President who had guided the country through the Great Depression and almost through World War II. Truman knew nothing about the atomic bomb or Roosevelt's dealing with the Allies. He did know, however, that a great president had died and the country was stuck with a novice to face the challenge of ending the most cataclysmic war in history and to make sense out of the complex peace that would follow.



Many expected little from a Truman presidency but the Senator from Missouri fooled them by solving some of the most momentous problems of the twentieth century by making the right decisions at the right time.

This course is about America's 33rd president who had the courage to drop atomic bombs -- Little Boy and Fat Man -- on Japan to end World War II. We will study the Manhattan Project that led to the construction of the bombs and hear from some of the scientists who developed them just ahead of Adolph Hitler's effort to beat us to the punch.

We will study Truman solution to a Soviet blockade of Berlin with an unprecedented airlift that forced Joseph Stalin to lift his hold on the city and open up traffic between the sectors governed by the Allies.

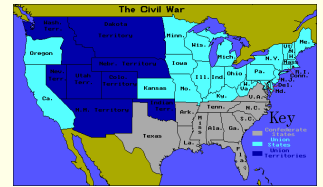
We will also discuss the Truman Doctrine, his "Fair Deal" and Marshall plans that stimulated spectacular economic recovery in war-torn Western Europe.

The course will be led by author and political historian Bob Short, who has been an instructor at ICL for the past decade. Short is a Young Harris grad who is the recipient of several state and national awards for excellence in documenting political history,

UNION OF STATES

This class is a continuation of the class offered in the Spring quarter. Learn more concerning America's Greatest Conflict; and the Confederate perspective. Let's look at the Confederate viewpoint relative to the causes, the prisons, the strategies, the battles and the results. History is written by the winner, let us learn from the loser or were they ... really? Come join me as we relive the events that reformed the Union of States into a Nation.



David Lamon has the heartbeat for the presenting truth based on facts from first-hand accounts and other sources. He has accumulated over 600 books on the War for Southern Independence in his personal library. From his reading and research, he has shared his Confederate programs with schools, civic organizations and other public ceremonies. Over the years, he has written Confederate editorials for newspapers and magazines. David has visited many of the battlefields of the War.

TREE IDENTIFICATION

The focus of this course is on the native woody tree species of the southern Appalachian region. We will identify local trees by understanding their specific morphological characteristics. This geographic area has an abundance of diverse tree species and we will cover many of the basics of how to identify different tree species followed by hikes through a local area to have "hands on" demonstrations and practice. Our primary focus will be on the identification of our deciduous or hardwood trees rather than the evergreen species. Many of the trees we will identify are readily distinguishable by simple characteristics of their leaf morphology but we will also observe bark and flower details where applicable. Additionally, we will cover using texts or field guides to identify trees,

but the focus will still be on simple observable characteristics. **The first two classes will meet at the University of Georgia Mountain Research and Education Center (GMREC) and examine many of the trees on those grounds.** The next two classes will meet at nearby locations where additional tree species can be found. Beginners are welcome and useful items to bring are a field guide and a hand lens. Two highly recommended reference books are "Trees of the Carolinas" by S. Tekiel and "Native Trees of the Southeast" by Kirkman, et al. Except for a short introduction during the first session, this is an outdoor class so please be prepared for relatively easy walks but also the possibility of rain.



Mark Westhafer is a biotechnology science professional and has experience as a patent attorney specializing in biotechnology inventions. He has had a longstanding interest in tree identification, developed while growing up in the Midwest. He has taught many courses in the field of agriculture while in graduate school and enjoys getting back into the woods of North Georgia to enjoy the amazing plant diversity in this area.

CHOESTOE – LAND OF THE DANCING RABBITS

During week 1 we will learn about the history of Choestoe: the meaning of the name; the Indian trails that converged there and the activities of the pioneers; how the land lottery was conducted; removal of the Indians (the Trail of Tears); and the one-room schools and churches. In week 2 we will discover Choestoe places: Coosa Gold Mine; Civil War Cave; Brasstown Bald Mtn.; Vogel State Park; Souther's Mill; Choestoe One-Room School; Blood Mtn.; Neels Gap; Helton Creek Falls; Georgia Mountain Experiment Station; and Trackrock Archeological Site. Week 3 – Choestoe's notable persons: State School Supt. Dr. M.D. Collins; Judge Tom Candler; Senator Zell Miller; Poet

Byron Herbert Reece, Educator Dora Allison Spiva; Sharpshooter Eric England; and Pioneer Aviator Micajah Clark Dyer. Week 4 – Our last week will be a Choestoe Field Trip to visit some of the places discussed in Weeks 2 and 3.

Sylvia was born and raised in the Choestoe District of Union County in Blairsville, GA. After retirement from a career in Atlanta, GA with the Internal Revenue Service, she returned with her husband, Billy, to take residence on the old family homeplace, which is also the historic homeplace of her great, great grandfather, Micajah Clark Dyer, Georgia's pioneer aviator. Sylvia has an avid interest in local history and enjoys writing poems, songs and stories about places and events of the mountain area. Her publications include The Choestoe Story (a child's rhyming book), Mountain Gold (a book of poetry featuring places and times in the North Georgia mountains); and Georgia's Pioneer Aviator, Micajah Clark Dyer (a second book about her great, great grandfather's invention). Her stories, poems and articles have appeared in The Atlanta Journal Constitution; The North Georgia News;



FALL WILDFLOWER RAMBLES

While you were playing in the summer sun, the trees and plants were hard at work keeping you cool overhead and underfoot. With autumn comes change, and this class will revel in those changes firsthand. North Georgia's diverse vegetation—wildflowers, ferns, mosses, lichens, and trees—will be observed with particular emphasis on individual characteristics within species and their habitat preferences. Due to the nature of botanical rambles and travel time, classes may extend beyond the specified class time. All classes will assemble at the ICL classroom and carpool to the selected field trip site. All rambles are of moderate length and difficulty. So come prepared with



field guide, hand lens and notepad to welcome another fall in the Southern Appalachians.

Elaine Delcuze has been a naturalist with Georgia State Parks and a field trip guide with the Georgia Conservancy, Botanical Society and Ornithological Society. She has been involved in the wildflower survey of the Chattahoochee National Forest and has contributed to the Conservancy's "Guide to the North Georgia Mountains." She is a member of the Preservation Board of the Georgia Mountains Research & Education Center and has done programs and news articles for the Native Plant Preservation Committee.

It is recommended to bring a pair of magnifying glasses if you have them. In beginner classes Beth will strive to have a bead sized so you can enjoy the experience. **A materials fee of \$12 will be collected the first day of class.**



Beth is a self taught enthusiast for this art form since 2006. She has taught bead weaving at Oasis since 2009. She continues to enjoy sharing her knowledge of bead weaving with others in the community.

billed to Medicare is correct. Course materials will be provided for the class from SHIP (Seniors Health Insurance Information Program).

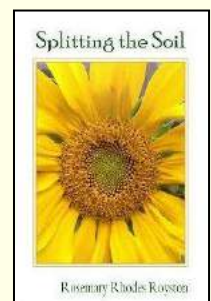
POETRY AND PLACE

This course will explore bird watching as a hobby to be enjoyed at any age and location. After an introduction to biology and behavior, the course will focus on finding and identifying the birds of the southern Appalachian region. Related topics will include field guides, binoculars, and migration. Weather permitting, most classes will be field trips to hotspots in the Young Harris / Lake Chatuge area. One or more field trips (Ivy Log Gap Road and Brasstown Bald) will be scheduled off campus starting before 9 am and extending beyond 11 am. Participants will need decent binoculars and a fairly recent field guide to eastern birds. Beginners are welcome!

Tom Striker has been a birder for over 40 years and, until recently, operated a backyard nature store in Blue Ridge with year-round educational activities such as seminars and bird walks. He has taught ICL birding classes since 2009 and teaches annually at the John C. Campbell Folk School. His first career as a professional forester included 15 years with the Forest Service. He is a member of the American Birding Association, Atlanta Audubon Society, Georgia Ornithological Society, and Fannin County Wing Watchers.



NRA HOME FIREARM SAFETY COURSE

This class is a non-shooting course and teaches students the basic knowledge, skills, and explains the attitude necessary for the safe handling and storage of firearms and ammunition in the home.

This four-hour course for safe gun handling is conducted in the classroom only. Students are taught NRA's three rules for safe gun handling; primary causes of firearms accidents; firearm parts; how to unload certain action types; ammunition components; cleaning; care; safe storage of firearms in the home; and the benefits of becoming an active participant in the shooting sports. Students will receive the NRA

Home Firearm Safety handbook, NRA Gun Safety Rules brochure, Basic Firearm Training Program brochure and course completion certificate. **A \$15 fee for NRA student materials will be collected the first day of class.**

Ed is a Life Member of the National Rifle Association (NRA). He began conducting firearms classes in 1987 and by 1992, prior to relocating to Hiawassee, he had trained more than 1200 people. He continues to provide certified NRA classes and has served as Range Officer and President of the Chatuge Gun Club since 1996. Ed is NRA certified in Training Counselor, Rifle, Pistol, Shotgun, Home Firearm Safety, Personal Protection, Chief Range Safety Officer and Reloading, Muzzle Loading Rifle, Pistol and Shotgun. He is a competitor in NRA Silhouette Small-bore Rifle, High-power Rifle and Pistol, competing with his wife in local, state, regional and national tournaments.
